We found Camp after struggling to find a way to help Miles solve some problems that our family couldn't solve. We'd had a bad misfire with a military boarding school.

Everyone was frustrated, and Miles agreed to try Camp mainly to get away from the hassle, not because our urban boy wanted to spend time chopping wood and living in a tent.

Camp changed Miles and our family for the better. Even when we are at odds, things don't escalate. And we are in a better place to support everyone's goals and overcome challenges

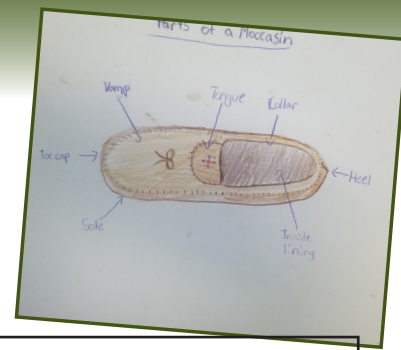
together. Miles is more patient when solving problems in the family and at school. When someone in authority isn't doing the best job, he tries hard to remember that he needs to respect that person.

For me, the direct, relational spirituality of Camp was a needed infusion into the reflective, expansive engagement with God that I'm more accustomed to.

The staff at Camp sure know how to put a word on it. The evaluations were so short but so meaningful. Every word counts for ten. When you slow down and take time to solve problems together, you come to understand both the problem and each other, much better.
